Back to Africa

Our partners lived in extreme poverty before they began creating Back to Africa Jewelry. Today, thanks to the purchasers of our products, these same people are now able to consistently feed and clothe their children, send them to school, purchase other resources like farm animals and help their family and neighbors who are not as fortunate. We have seen firsthand how a small paper bead or simple ceramic pendant can profoundly impact a community halfway around the world.

Beads for Life

In Uganda, we put money into the hands of women by creating global markets for recycled paper bead jewelry and shea products. Money becomes savings, savings becomes hope, hope becomes opportunity and sustainable businesses are born.

Bridges of Hope

Some of the items we sell are from Kenya, India, Haiti, Pakistan, Vietnam and Thailand. We support Fair Trade because the organizations in the Fair Trade Network provide assistance to those in poor communities around the world with low interest loans, ideas and advice for safety practices in product development, and a market for their products. We are happy to provide those unique gifts to the community and at the same time make a difference in the lives of the artisans.

Central Asia Team, CFC

The handmade jewelry is from Suinshi Fellowship, our church plant in Almaty, Kazakhstan. It is sent for us to sell in order to raise funds for the acquisition of a church building. All proceeds from the sale of this jewelry will be returned to Suinshi Fellowship for their building fund.

Dharmi Socks

The beautifully designed wool/acrylic socks knitted by Dharmi, a woman living in the small village of Manali, India. The proceeds from the sale go a long way to provide income for her family.

Solid Grounds Coffee Shoppe, located in Christian Fellowship Church, supports third world, fair-trade coffee growers because we believe that our choices can impact others around the globe.

Loom House Goods from Uncharted International

The handmade, fair trade products are made by adult orphans who were raised in Myanmar (Burma). They now working in self-sustaining jobs at Loom House. Blankets, scarves, jewelry and a variety of other products provide job opportunities for these people in need. Our purses are from Afghanistan where we work with families of street children by providing a sewing machine to make items that can produce income for the families and enable the children to attend school.
